1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Govt. Dr.Shyama Prasad Mukherjee Science and Commerce College, is a post graduate college accredited with grade B in 2016 by NAAC. The college offers courses B.Sc./B.Com./B.H.Sc. and B.A. at UG level and M.A. History/Sociology, M.Sc. Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, Mathematics and M.Com.at PG level. New courses B.A., B.Sc Home Science, M.A.History, Sociology and M.Sc. Zoology/Botany were introduced in the year 2018. The online classes were scheduled from September 2020 to March 2021due to corona pandemic. The college shifted to new building at Raj harsh colony, Kolar, Bhopal in October 2020.

In the beginning of the session, the time table committee prepares the time table and accordingly the classes are conducted. Teachers prepare Teaching plan and conduct their classes accordingly.

Continuous & Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE) is conducted twice a year through various modes like Objective Type Question, Surprise Test, Home Assignments, Presentations, Posters, Quiz etc. Examinations are conducted as per the Academic Calendar issued by the Affiliated University. Annual Function, Sports, NCC, NSS and other activities are also incorporated in the Academic Calendar. Besides this, literary and cultural activities are held as per the Calendar.

Moral values are the behavioural practices and form a part of the curriculum at UG level. Environmental awareness and its knowledge are included in the foundation course in the second year of UG classes.

An internship gives the student opportunity for career exploration and development to learn new skills. During the Semester system in 2016-17, 2017-18, U.G. VI Semester & P.G. IV Semester students visited different

organisations for internship work. Annual pattern has been adopted at UG level from the year 2018-19.

The institution has feedback mechanism in order to acquire information about the services provided to the stakeholders. Survey method has been used to take student feedback. Formal as well as informal evaluations are used to make improvement in the relevant fields.

On the basis of the feedback obtained various facilities have been enhanced in the institute like Installation of water cooler with RO, Canteen, Wheel chair, Vending machine in Girls Common Room, Sanitizing machine, enrichment of library with new books.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Teaching learning is a combined process where a teacher establishes particular learning objectives and assesses the outcomes of the instruction. With the commencement of the new academic session the Induction Programme is organized for the newly admitted students to introduce them with various schemes and aspects of the institute. This would apprise students and parents with the rules and regulations of the college alongwith curricular and co-curricular activities. The syllabus is also made available to the students. The college has its own website (http://gscbhopal.in/) from where students can gather information pertaining to the college. Many experimental learning strategies are being used in pure sciences. Apart from classroom teaching, we promote effective learning by conducting different practicals/experiments in our laboratories. We also impart education through field studies.

A special provision for slow learners is operative through Help Desk in the college. The Convenor seeks the list of slow learners from each department and accordingly helps the students by providing notes, reference material etc. apart from Remedial Classes. Frequent teacher-student interaction is held to comprehend their difficulties and efforts are made to enhance their learning by conducting extra-classes and remedial classes. The college practises a teaching methodology which focuses on imparting education through a learner-centric approach. The college facilitates the sharing of resources for the overall development of students through various forums like Vivekananda Career Counselling and placement cell and NCC/NSS units. The learnercentric teaching is promoted by ensuring classroom environment to be learner-friendly. The classroom environment is kept conducive to make learners feel free to share their ideas and form a healthy discussion. Entire campus is enabled with Wi-Fi facility to make use of available e-resources. Teachers are using ICT tools for effective teaching-learning process.

The college has adopted a transparent system to ensure effective internal evaluation, comprising of internal examination held progressively during the semester/year. The college has clearly stated learning outcomes of the Programmes and courses. The feedback mechanism is followed by the institution. Programmes and courses offered by the college are well displayed on the college website alongwith the list of all faculty members.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The Institute constitutes a research committee comprising of senior faculty members. The institute is a recognised research centre in Chemistry, Botany, Mathematics, Commerce and Bio-Science (Zoology). 16 faculty members are recognized research supervisors. More than 50 Scholars has been awarded Ph.D. degree under the guidance of these faculty members along with research papers publication in national and international journals during the last five years.

The institute has an enriched library in order to promote research activities. The library subscribes Research Journals, Periodicals and e-journals to cater to the needs of various departments. Library Facilities are optimally utilized by the faculty in their research. Financial Support is also received from UGC, CRO.Bhopal and MPCST for conducting the research, workshops and training programmes.Research facility in the Department of Chemistry is available. The new and advanced Research equipment's have been made available for the Scholars to pursue their Research Studies.

In our endeavour to upgrade our benchmarks continuously, there are regular publications of research papers by the faculty members in national and international journals. The faculty members are invited to chair the technical session and to participate in round table discussion at various national platforms.NCC and NSS units of the college actively conduct extension activities. NSS unit sensitize students and village communities about Swacchata, Hygiene, Sanitation and Environment during the NSS Camp held every year. The institute has been promoting the participation of students and faculty in extension activities by organizing blood donation camps in the campus. Besides this the institute organizes awareness programmes on AIDS, Right to vote, Adult literacy, Cleanliness drive and Plantation etc.

The institution has conducted more than 20 workshops/webinars on different topics during the review period. Research committee of the institution has conducted a discursive session with the students on the identification of key aspects of entrepreneurship, converting an idea into a feasible business plan/start up, develop leadership and team building skills.Institution has signed three MOUs for value added programmes, internship and student development programme. Departments organize industrial and field trips to enhance the knowledge of students.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college has been shifted at Rajharsh colony in the year 2020 in a newly constructed three storeyed building. There are 15 classrooms, one virtual classroom, 07 smart classes and 14 laboratories in the new building of the college. The institute has a conference hall for academic activities. The maintenance of the building, furniture and equipments is done by the grant provided by the government and by the Janbhagidari Samiti of the institution. UGC also provides grants for the maintenance of infrastructure.

There is a well-equipped **Library** in the college. There are around 20 thousand books available. It includes the books purchased under book bank scheme, UGC, Government and Janbhagidari. The Library is going to subscribe for 15 journals, 8 Daily newspapers and 10 Magazines very soon. The Automation of the library is about to be completed. The membership for DELNET/FLIBNET/Shodh Ganga is under process. Every year the books of Rs 1500/- & stationary of Rs 500/- are distributed to each student belonging to SC/ST category. Sports and physical education play an important role in human resource development. The Institute has a separate unit for sports which is looked after by full time Sports Officer. A concrete sports calendar is developed in concurrence with the Department of Higher Education and university sports calendar. For maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure and also for organizing various sports activities, fund is allocated by college administration. Student Support and Progression

The students of the institution are benefitted by many central and state government schemes like central sector scholarship, SC/ST/OBC post-metric scholarships, SC and ST Awas yojana, Mukhyamantri Medhavi Vidhyarthi yojana, Mukhyamantri Jan KalyanYojana, Gaon ki beti yojnana, Pratibhakiranyojana and many more different schemes.

- Swami Vivekananda Career Counselling Cell remains active throughout the year for soft skill development and career counselling of the students of the institution. For this different capacity enhancement and awareness programmes, webinars, workshops centred on preparation for various Competitive Examinations are organised from time to time. Cambridge Assessment English Training Programme and Remedial Classes are among the significant ones. The cell also organises online and offline campus placements.
- Student Grievance Committee redresses the grievances received, in time. For student progression P.G. in History, Sociology (Arts), Botany and Zoology (Science) were reopened in the institution.
- To cope up with ICT based learning, the smart phones under the scheme of Government of M.P. were distributed to the students of UG final year in the year 17-18 and 18-19.
- Every year cultural and literary activities like YuvaUtsav and Annual Function are organised. A number of students take part in different activities like Debate, Essay, Elocution, Mimicry, Poster making, Rangoli, Mehndi, Salad decoration, Dance competition, Mr.Annupam and Miss. Annupama.
- On the other hand, sports activities are also organized every year. The student participation in different sports at national level is remarkable achievement of the institution. The student council is formed through elections to represent in academic and administrative bodies of the institution. The Alumni association organises meetings and collects the funds for various activities. It has been registered in the session 21-22. During the Corona Pandemic, Alumni members along with the faculty members felt their Philanthropic responsibility to help the needy specially those who lost their jobs. 2. 2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

College believes in the adoption of student centric methods to enhance involvement of students as a part of participative learning and problem solving methodology, lecture method, interactive method, project and field work method, experiment method, computer-assisted method etc. The conventional chalk and talk method is also used by the teachers. Along with these methods teachers also use PowerPoint presentations and computer-based materials, Seminar and quiz are also a part of teaching method. Field Visit, Industrial visit and Guest lectures/Lecture series are also incorporated in student centric methods. Some more such methods are described below-

- 1. **Experiential Learning** This method is used in science subjects, geography, personality development, physical education, Desktop Publication etc. to acquire knowledge through direct experience at individual level. With the help of experiments students know the basic fact of the topic deeply and easily. Students take keen interest in experiential learning.
- 2. **Project methods-** Project work is organized for students to stimulate interest in the subject and provide ample environment of opportunities of for building their career. As per the requirement of syllabus, the project work is done.
- 3. **Interactive methods-** All the departments try to make learning interactive by motivating students for group discussion, quiz and creative analysis during the class discuss on various topics along with questions and answers on current affairs.
- 4. **ICT Enabled Teaching-** 7 Smart class rooms and 1 Virtual class room is available in the college for effective teaching. College has adopted modern pedagogy to enhance teaching-learning process. The faculty members used Google meet, Zoom, Teachmint etc. to carryout online classes, tests and for lecture delivery. All the departments conduct webinars, workshops and Guest lectures/Lecture

series on various relevant topics.

- 5. **Black-Board presentation-** Teachers also use traditional black-board, chalk and talk teaching method. During the class, teachers give problems to the students to solve in the black-board, this simulates the interaction between the teacher and student and also enhance the attentiveness of the students in the class-room.
- 6. **Internal Assessment-** Internal assessments are so planned so as to encourage students independently. Written assignments are required to be submitted by students and these need to be done individually so as to enhance confidence and develop writing skills.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The college has transparent and robust evaluation process in terms of frequency and mode. In order to ensure transparency in internal/external assessments, the schedule of CCE is communicated with to the students well in time. The principal holds meetings of the faculties and directs them to ensure effective implementation of the evaluation process. Admissions are given as per the guidelines issued by the Department of Higher Education. The students are assessed continuously through various modes of evaluation. Continuous comprehensive evaluation is made through group discussion, unit tests, assignments, field visit/field work and presentation. Personal guidance is given to the students who are slow learners/weak at studies after their assessments. Post graduate students are asked to deliver the seminars/power point presentation on the subject related topics allotted by their teachers. For transparent and robust internal assessment the following mechanism is adopted-

- \cdot Internal Examination
- \cdot Question paper setting
- \cdot Conduct of examination
- · Interaction with students regarding their internal assessment.

Regularity and interest of the students enhances with the conduction of CCE. The students actively participate in various co-curricular and extracurricular activities for their overall personality development. The presentation enhances their communication skills which is very essential to face the interviews.

Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time-bound and efficient. There is complete transparency in the internal assessment. The procedure adopted is as directed by the Department of Higher Education. At the beginning of the session faculty members inform the students about the various components of the assessment process. The internal assessment test schedules are prepared as per the university guidelines and communicated to the students well in advance. To ensure proper conduct of formative tests, two invigilators are assigned in each room. Evaluation is done by the course handling faculty members within a week from the date of examination. The evaluated answer scripts verified by HOD randomly to ensure the standard evaluation process. The marks obtained by the students in internal assessment tests are uploaded on the university web portal. After noting down the values of practical observation and validating the theoretical aspects students must submit practical record regularly. In practical exam the students are assist on the basis of regularity, overall performances, vivavoce and timely submission of practical record besides conducting practicals in laboratory. The final

practical examination is conducted by the external examiner appointed by the affiliating university in coordination with internal examiner while external examination is conducted by the university. For internal/external assessment the institute appoints a senior supervisor for smooth conduction of examination. If students face any problems, they are solved by the shift superintendent. The grievances during the conduction of theory examination are considered and discussed in consultation with the principal and if necessary forwarded to the university by examination.

- 4. Feedback Evaluation: The Institution collects feedback from students.
- 5. **Internships:** Students are encouraged to take up internships, projects, fieldwork, community engagement etc. This helps them to obtain necessary skills and practical experience in their chosen discipline.
- 6. **Placements:** One of the most important Programme Outcomes of Undergraduate Degree is the employability of students upon successful completion of their degree programme. The college has a vibrant Placement Cell, which caters to the demands of companies from different sectors.

- 3. The college runs three self financing courses namely, Biotechnology, , Computer Science and Computer Application at Under Graduate level to meet the local needs and popular demand of students.
- 4. To develop the Entrepreneur skill of the students, Industrial visits are organized.
- 5. To sensitize students about environmental issues, medicinal plants useful in Ayurveda and to make them realize the significance of Ancient Indian culture and heritage, local excursions and educational tours were organized.
- 6. As far as subjective knowledge is concerned, expert lectures along with seminar and webinars were

organized by different departments in collaboration with PG Tech Indore and Bhopal Intellectual Progressive Education Society.

- 7. Physical and mental fitness is a prerequisite for a healthy life, Keeping this in mind, the Sports department organized a seminar on "Common Orthopaedic Problems, Fat and Fitness" and Yoga sessions to facilitate the participation of students and faculties.
- 8. To compete in the era of globalisation and to enhance the employability ratio, Cambridge Assessment English training programme was conducted by the department of English under the aegis of the Department of Higher Education, M.P.
- 9. The one of the main objectives of the institution is to achieve excellence in Research, in this perspective a central instrumentation lab is established having AAS (Atomic Absorption Spectrophotometer) and UV Spectrophotometer along with other useful instruments.

Institute had infrastructural support from DST-FIST; e-learning room is equipped from DST-FIST grant. Institute also is beneficiary of RUSA (component-9). Institute also receives financial & infrastructural assistance from World Bank Quality Improvement Project of Government of M.P.

Higher Education in Madhya Pradesh is functioning administratively with secretariat and Ministry at Bhopal. Commissioner higher education is the supreme functional authority at secretariat and issues orders directly to colleges in M.P. Additional Directors are responsible for colleges of the specific division.

Institute to implement different schemes with quality initiatives as per norms. Permanent faculties and staff is appointment through under MPPSC. Guest Faculty against vacant posts for conventional subjects is also invited through the online mechanism chalked out by the Department of Higher Education, M.P.

Guest Faculty for self-finance courses under various programmes is invited by Secretary, Janbhagidari.As per the directives of state government, a Janbhagidari committee is constituted in the college, to help the college in development process. Local social workers, politicians, administrative officer and college teachers are the members of this committee. Main aim for the establishment of Janbhagidari Committee is to generate funds from local people through voluntary donations and taking college development fees from students. The amount generated may be utilized for the various development work like infrastructure development, maintenance and management of the college.

Principal is the head of the institution with drawing & disbursing financial powers. Principal appoints the Convenors of the various committees to help in the administrative work related to general administration, academics, quality issues & student's welfare issues.

Convenors of the various committees report to the Principal whereas committee members report to the corresponding convenor. All the committees have fair participation of students, student voice are fully respected & heard.

Head Clerk of the college looks into the establishment related affairs of the colleges, LDC & Accountants help in keeping the accounts & financial records in order in the office. Regular financial audits are executed in the college by internal financial committee, external appointed CA & by the Accountant General of M.P. state also. AGMP raises financial explanations as per the process these queries have to be answered if any within the stipulated time.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The institute mobilizes its funds received from the state Government, UGC, RUSA, World Bank, and Janbhagidari in a well- planned manner in accordance with the approval of various statutory commitees constituted by the principal. Funds received from the state government are spent on payment of salary of teaching and non teaching staff. For every financial year a budget is prepared by a Finance commitee, keeping in mind the development criteria of the institution, and accordingly provisions are made. The UGC committee proposes a budget for the alloction of funds under various heads to the finance committee on its approval. The UGC deploys the fund and maintains a record of it. Like wise, all the above- mentioned committees try to utilize the sanctioned ammount and make the optimal utilization of the available financial resources as per the government rules of Madhya Pradesh. The procedure of purchase is also very transparent. Proposals, as per requirement are invited by all the Department and committees within a specific period of time. On receiving the proposals, tenders are invited in an open bid. The best bid is selected in the presence of the finance committee. A record of expense and balance is maintained by the concerned committee.

The institute conducts external financial audit regularly. In the session 2017-18 and session 2018-19 it was done by Mr. Sanjay Shrivastava & co. (Chartered Account), Santosh Tower, 148,M.P.Nagar, Zone-I,

Bhopal and in the session 2019-20 and 2020- 21, it was done by Mr. Gupta Gourav & Associates (Chartered Accountants) 51-A, Piyush Nagar Awadhpuri, Bhopal, 462020. The external agency doing audit tallies expenditure and receipts. Inspects balance sheet and books and discrepancy (if any) is pointed out. The Tally Account Software was purchased through the World Bank in the session 2020-21 for Rs. 30000/-. The Internal auditor was also appointed through the World Bank fund of Rs. 60000/-. The member of this audit committee go for random checking of documents, service book etc.

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format provided in the Manual

Response:

Best Practice 1 –

Title- Online Teaching, Learning & Evaluation

Objectives:

- To cope up with the pandemic, the institution took up the initiative to teach the students, as per govt. directives and used the online teaching platform to compensate the loss incurred during the lockdown.
- To enable students to prepare and complete their curriculum in due course of time; To prepare them to be successful in the university exams.
- The underlying principle behind this practice was to prepare them for challenges in the difficult situation.
- To Provide access to college level learning.

Context:

Facing the Pandemic silnation and alternative arrangement for dissemination of knowledge and learning.

Practice:

In the beginning, the online training programmes for the faculty were organized and they were made familiar with various apps like Google meet, Teachment, Zoom app, Google class room etc. The most preferrable app was Google meet as the institution was instructed by the department of higher education, Madhya Pradesh, to choose that app and it was free of charge also.

In the next step class wise Whats App groups were made. They were instructed to download the same App & join the link provided in their respective class groups .This led to the smooth conduction of online classes. Evaluation was done via various online Quizzes, presentations for CCE prescribed in the syllabus. For Objective and subjective evaluation, question papers were shared in the corresponding whatsapp class groups & the answer sheets in the PDF form were submitted in the allotted time by the students.

Evidence of the Success:

The number of students in online classes increased comparatively. Their queries were solved. The rapport between the teacher & the taught was achieved 80% of the students appeared in this innovative mode of evaluation. The main - annual and semester examination 2020-21 was conducted on open book exam pattern with 100% result.

Problem faced:

- The network was the major issue faced by both the faculty & the students during online classes. some of the students did not have the mobile phone facility. Some had the mobile facility but availability was not there.
- The students belonging to the weaker section found difficulty in attending the online classes. They were given opportunity to appear in traditional i.e. offline mode of exam for CCE. Many of the faculty members got infected by Covid-19 pandemic. Hence it was a great challenge to manage online classes and exams etc.
- For many students one of the biggest challenges of online learning is the struggle with focusing on the screen for long periods of time.
- There is also a greater chance for students to be easily distracted by social media or other sites.
- The data related to the teachers and students could be misused.

Notes:-

Besides conducting online classes, some of the college teachers recorded their lectures and uploaded them on you tube.

The significance of online classes as observed is as follows -

- Online classes are convenient as well as flexible.
- Online classes offer more individual attention.
- It helps in interaction between the teacher & the taught.
- Online education enables us to study / teach from anywhere in the world
- Not only it saves time but also money.
- The students become tech-savy and now they are able to connect themselves at national and international level.

Best Practice II –

Title of the Practice – Philanthropic Responsibility of the Institution

Objectives:

- To provide assistance to the people affected by the Covid-19 pandemic.
- To give them financial, medical aid as well as essential items (edibles)
- To generate awareness for social responsibility among the faculty & the students.

Context:

The college decided to undertake humanitarian activity during pandemic.

Practice:

He concluded that the significance of a research lies in its quality and not in quantity .The need therefore is for those concerned with research to pay due attention to designing and adhering to appropriate methodology throughout for improving the quality of research.

• Over the last two decades,IPR have progressed to the point that they now play a significant part in the Global economy's development.The successful completion of the Agreement on Trade Related Aspects of Intellectual Property Right (TRIPS) in the WTO resulted in increased protection and enforcement.In India, the changes pertaining to IPR took a major reform towards the end of 20th century.In this context ,Intellectual Property Right awareness is critical to shape an environment that is conducive to fostering creativity and innovation. Keeping this fact in view ,the one day seminar was organised to highlight the major laws that govern the IPR sections of the country. Dr.VP Singh Gaur, Professor, Political Science graced the occasion as Chief Speaker. IPR issues including patent, trademark, copyright,design, trade secrets ,geographical

indicator and plant varieties were discussed and debated in this seminar.
